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Eye Makeup Remover

A product formulated to dissolve eye makeup on the most fragile skin on the body. The whole case for a dedicated remover is that **the alternative is friction**, and friction on the eyelid is what causes the lash loss, laxity and irritation people blame on their mascara.

The formats

Format	How it works	Best for
Bi-phase	Separated oil and water layers, shaken to mix	Waterproof mascara and long-wear liner — the strongest option
Micellar water	Micelles capture oil-bound pigment	Everyday, non-waterproof makeup
Cleansing oil / balm	Like dissolves like	Everything, including heavy layers
Cream / lotion	Emollient, wiped off	Dry and sensitive lids
Pre-soaked pads	Convenience	Travel; more friction than the rest

Bi-phase removers are the ones that actually shift waterproof formulas, because waterproof mascara is built on volatile hydrocarbons and waxes that need an oil phase to dissolve. The water phase handles water-soluble pigment at the same time. Shake before use — an unshaken bi-phase is doing half its job.

Technique matters more than product

The single most useful thing on this page:

1. **Soak a pad.** A dry or barely-damp pad drags.
2. **Hold it against closed lashes for 20–30 seconds** without moving. This is the step that does the work; the solvent needs contact time to dissolve the film.
3. **Wipe downward and outward, once**, following the lash direction.
4. **Repeat with a fresh pad** rather than scrubbing with the same one.
5. **For liner on the lash line**, use a cotton bud rather than a pad.
6. **Follow with a gentle cleanse** — remover residue left on the lid is an unpreserved-for-leave-on surfactant or oil film that can migrate into the eye overnight and blur vision.

Never pull, never scrub, and never rub back and forth. Eyelash loss from removal is more common than eyelash loss from anything a mascara does.

The oil-in-the-eye problem

Oil-based removers work best and are the most likely to leave a film that blurs vision and, in some people, irritates the ocular surface. Two mitigations: rinse afterward, and — if blurring is persistent — switch to a bi-phase used precisely, or an oil-free micellar formula for the lid and reserve the oil for the lashes.

Contact lens wearers should **remove lenses first**, always, and choose a remover labelled as suitable.

Where it sits in the rules

Cosmetic in the US — FDA primary category **(03) eye makeup preparations** — with the eye-area rules attached:

- **Only colour additives approved for eye-area use**, where a remover is tinted.
- The **mercury carve-out** — mercury compounds are prohibited except as a preservative in eye-area products at ≤ 65 ppm, and only where no other safe and effective preservative is available. This exception exists precisely because preserving eye-area products is difficult.
- Under MoCRA the **small-business exemption from registration and listing does not apply** to products that regularly contact the mucous membrane of the eye.

Fragrance in an eye makeup remover is worth avoiding on principle; it is applied millimetres from a mucous membrane and left in contact for half a minute.

Shelf life

Six to twelve months after opening. Water-containing removers stored in a bathroom and dispensed by tipping onto a pad are ordinary contamination cases. Pre-soaked pads dry from the top down once opened and their preservative load is correspondingly high.

The overriding rule: **stop using every eye product at the first sign of an eye infection, discard the ones in use, and see a clinician.** Never share a remover, and do not decant one into an unsterile travel bottle.
